CELEBRATING OLDEST LIVING BOXWELL ALUMNUS AND VETERAN

James Leon Parker was just 13 when he first attended summer camp at Boxwell. The year was 1939 and camp was located in Linton, Tennessee on the Harpeth River. Mr. Parker went on to reach the rank of Eagle and then was drafted into service during WWII. After the war and starting a family, Mr. Parker continued his participation in Scouting by serving as the Scoutmaster for his son, James's, Troop 4 in Tullahoma, Tennessee. He would next attend Boxwell in the 1960s at its current location in Lebanon, Tennessee.

Now, at age 95, Mr. Parker sat down with Major General William Hickman, U.S. Army (retired) to talk about his love of Scouting and how he will be the oldest living veteran to be honored at the new Gateway being built at Boxwell Reservation. The new

Gateway is being built in honor of the 100th anniversary of the camp that has flourished across ten decades at four locations. Major General Hickman is leading the effort to recognize veterans and current service members who attended Boxwell as Scouts or leaders.

Mr. Parker was born and raised in Nashville. He said he worked hard all of his life and being a Scout helped teach him values that helped prepare him for life. When asked what he enjoyed most during his time at Boxwell Mr. Parker said, "I loved everything about being a Scout and being at camp. There wasn't anything I didn't like. I remember taking the streetcar to west Nashville where a truck from Linton would pick us up and take us to camp. We'd all jump in the back and away we'd go. One thing I remember well is the cook at the dining hall coming out with a platter of biscuits and tossing them to us. Those were the best biscuits I have ever eaten." As a Scoutmaster, Mr. Parker shared that he took his troop on a camping outing every month. One in particular sticks out in his memory because it snowed so much that the tents collapsed. "We just covered ourselves with blankets to stay warm," he said.

Working for the Tennessee Central Railroad helped him hone skills that he would use when he was drafted into the U.S. Army Air Corps during WWII. Following basic training, Mr. Parker worked with the railway battalion in Wyoming before leaving to serve as an engineer at an airbase on the Azores Islands off the coast of Portugal. Upon his return he resumed his work with the railroad until his career took him to the Arnold Engineering Development Center located on Arnold Air Force Base near Manchester, Tennessee where he worked until his retirement.

Being involved in Scouting has been a highlight in Mr. Parker's life. Both he and Major General Hickman agree that being a Scout in the Middle Tennessee Council, and attending camp at Boxwell, made a positive impact on their lives and taught them skills they called upon while serving our Country.

A Note from Campaign Chair, Harris Haston

The Middle Tennessee Council has seen a resurgence in Scouting activity and programs over the last month. We had over 1,000 Scouts and leaders attend one of our council camporees recently, and over 50 NEW Scouting Packs, Troop, Posts, Crews and Labs have started or are being started. The commitment of our Scouting leaders to keep programs going through COVID is amazing. Our Council is fortunate to have such a strong core of committed volunteers and staff who want to ensure



current and future generations of Scouts receive leadership training, character development and a spirit of service. Our 100th Council Anniversary is being celebrated this year with camporees, jamborees, luncheons, speakers, and a rededication by our professional and volunteer staffs to continue providing our Middle Tennessee youth with the skills to become the leaders of tomorrow.

Boxwell Reservation is our council's showcase camp, located within an hour's drive time from all our district's scout troops. As you know from past editions of this newsletter, Boxwell Reservation is the primary beneficiary of our capital campaign. Funds collected to date have delivered three new shower houses, the third one funded by The Christy-Houston Foundation, Inc. is just in time for our June summer camp opening and is among other needed camp projects. More than 1,000 people attended the 100th Anniversary Camporee at Boxwell in early May and summer camp is fully booked for its five-week term and will host more than 2,000 Scouts.

Over the last sixty years at its current location, more 500,000 Scouts have passed through the Boxwell Reservation gates. We know that the families who funded the construction of Boxwell in 1960 would be pleased with how their investment has paid off in building strong character and making lives better.

There could no better investment than to give to the Middle Tennessee Council's Boxwell Capital Campaign. Our campaign's largest capital project, the construction of the new Harwell Leadership Center, needs our financial support. This anchor facility for Boxwell Reservation will provide a base for camp operations for the next 100 years. Our oath as a Scout is 'To help other people at all times.' This facility will help us help others to learn what it means to be a Scout for life.

Please help make the next 100 years at Boxwell as great for our council as the last 100.
